The August 4, 2009 regular meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Halfmoon was called to order at 7:00 pm by Supervisor Wormuth in the A. James Bold Meeting Room at the New Town Hall, 2 Halfmoon Town Plaza with the following members present:

Melinda A. Wormuth, Supervisor Walter F. Polak, Councilman Regina C. Parker, Councilwoman Paul L. Hotaling, Councilman Craig A. Hayner, Councilman Mary J. Pearson, Town Clerk Lyn A. Murphy, Town Attorney Matthew J. Chauvin, Deputy Town Attorney

The Town Board Workshop was held in the Board Room at 6:15 pm; no action was taken. The Supervisor led the Pledge of Allegiance.

The Supervisor stated first is a Proclamation Recognizing August 1 through August 7th as National Clown Week and welcomed the Clowns. She stated they are coming to the Town summer camp carnival day tomorrow and the kids are very excited. She stated the summer camp serves over 750 children and she will present this Proclamation with the children and the clowns tomorrow. She stated there would be a couple hundred kids here tomorrow. She read the Proclamation as follows:

Let it be known to all those present that the Electric City Clown Alley, Clowns of America International, and the Town of Halfmoon, New York shall take part in the celebration of International Clown Week

WHEREAS, the President of the United States did proclaim that the first week of August would be recognized as International Clown Week, and that all Governors and local officials shall encourage such recognition by their citizens, and

WHEREAS, Clowns are recognized the World over as messengers of good tidings, bringing happiness and joy to all those whose lives they touch, and

WHEREAS, it is universally known that laughter is the best medicine, and

WHEREAS, Clowns have helped us preserve our sense of humor and ability to laugh at ourselves, and

WHEREAS, Clowns encourage laughter in the young and old, and rich and poor, alike, now

THEREFORE, I, Mindy A. Wormuth, Supervisor of the Town of Halfmoon, proclaim that the week of August 1 through 7, 2009 shall be recognized as International Clown Week within the Town of Halfmoon, and, shall encourage all citizens to give fitting recognition to the Clowns of the World.

The Supervisor invited the clowns "Sparky" and "Jazzie" to come forward and thanked them for attending.

The Supervisor wished Mrs. Murphy a Happy Birthday.

At 7:10 pm the Supervisor opened the Public Hearing for the Town Code Article 5- Section 165-14 C-1 Commercial District; no one wished the Notice of Public Hearing read.

Attorney Murphy stated this is an amendment to our current zoning ordinance that would allow for the sale of motor vehicles in both commercial and light industrial commercial districts. She stated the difference is, now if you are selling used motor vehicles, farm equipment or trailers you have to be incidental to a brand new dealership sales and would be a difficult statue to defend and the Town Board does not want to discriminate between new and used cars. She stated this is a slight adjustment in the wording of the zoning land use for those areas to allow for the sales of motor vehicles in general.

She asked, before the Board decides to act regarding this, that they pass a Neg Dec pursuant to SEQRA. She stated the Town Planner has completed all the necessary documentation showing that this will not have environmental impacts on the Town.

There being no questions or comments the Supervisor closed the public hearing at 7:12 pm.

REPORTS OF BOARD MEMBERS AND TOWN ATTORNEY

Councilman Polak reported the Fall Clean up days at the Town Transfer Station are scheduled for September 15, 18, 19, 22, 25 & 26 but no toxic substances can be dropped off. He stated the Special Collection Day for Household Hazardous Waste in Clifton Park will be September 26th and forms are available in the Town Clerk's office.

Councilman Hotaling reported he worked with the Water department and Supervisor Wormuth and they showed how strong they have been with the dredge issues by switching over to Troy water. He stated on Friday it spiked over the legal limit and goes to show we have all our "ducks in a row" and working hard.

He reported three water plant employees, Tom Lundquist, Bill Robitaille and Ron Fellows have completed and passed the Water Course "D" at Morrisville to get their "Class D" license to maintain the water system.

He stated tomorrow night Halfmoon Celebrations will have Mike & the Monsters in the courtyard.

Councilwoman Parker reported there was a \$300.00 change order to D & E for the HVAC Contract for the Town Park to re-orientate the boiler in the facility building to make it fit safely.

Supervisor Wormuth reported on a change order for the Town Park, Kingsley Arms, Inc. General Site Contract #1 for several different items; to substitute concrete for granite and add asphalt pavement at Park road, Clubhouse parking area and at maintenance facility in the amount of \$270,903; add retaining wall at south entrance parking, \$12,614; adjust manhole cover at south entrance, \$2,769; change type-3 binder to type-6 top at walks and Clubhouse Plaza, \$4,600; modify the guide rail at north entrance \$4,971 for a total change order amount of \$295,857.

She stated, as reported, there was a spike in the legal limit of PCB's and we continue to be very proud of the decision this Board made to be on water full-time from the City of Troy so that we don't have to worry about notification procedures with EPA or GE. She stated they have found them to not be consistent and reliable and she continues to be proud of the decision this Board made to purchase the water from Troy in order to protect our residents

Supervisor Wormuth opened public privilege for discussion of agenda topics; no one had questions or comments.

A creation of appropriations is necessary to create the project budgetary accounts for the Hudson River Park Phase I for Engineering and Final Design. The Town of Halfmoon owns approximately 2.5 acres of land on State Routes 4 & 32. The parcel has approximately 270 feet of Hudson River frontage, and is located near the Brookwood Road intersection with State Routes 4 & 32. A small, ranch style house of approximately 1260 sq. ft. is located on the property. This house serves as the office location for the Town's Maintenance Department. The Hudson River Waterfront Park project will transform the property into a riverfront park with the following amenities: Picnic area with pavilion/gazebo; Handicapped accessible boat launch for small, car-top watercraft, such as canoes, kayaks, etc; Docking appropriate for small watercraft; Restroom facilities with new septic/leaching system, and Parking area. This project requires either razing or moving the building that currently houses the Maintenance Department offices. The cost of Phase I is \$110,000 of which NYS Environmental Protection Fund (EPF) allocated to the Local Waterfront Revitalization Program (LWRP) administered by the NYS Department of State, Division of Coastal Resources for \$55,000 and the balance of \$55,000 will matched by the Town.
