PUBLIC PRIVILEGE (for discussion of non-agenda items)

Joe Christopher, 96 Warner Road: I would just like to quickly address duplexes, the stated legislation to address residents' concerns about the number of duplexes and other multifamily homes being built in Halfmoon versus single family ones. So far, the only ones that have been denied a special use permit were those three proposed in Windsor Woods. I think that some of the approvals have been appropriate, however, when that legislation was passed, members of the Planning Board acknowledged that residents had made clear that they don't want duplexes or other multi-unit development. I am not sure that those people have a voice if they don't come out for themselves. It seems if no residents come out to oppose it and the property owner says that it will be owner occupied, that it passes.

I think that some of those things are fair criteria but, I think that it won't take long before parties know what to say to get these things through. I would just like you to think about that. I have a question; I was just wondering if a landowner gets a special use permit, is that permit grandfathered onto the buyer of that parcel if he then sells it?

Attorney Murphy: Depending on the time period, yes.

Joe Christopher: OK. Speaking of the multi-unit development, I was here for that Plant Road meeting, the Planning Board Meeting. I am not sure if all of you were here, but I thought that emotions were running pretty high. I think it was sad to watch the way it unfolded; I think that people felt duped. I was just wondering if you thought that the approval of that Pleasant Valley PDD is a positive contribution

Attorney Murphy: I am going to caution this Board about commenting on the actions of another board. They are separate legislative bodies and they are prohibited by statute on commenting on the actions of one another.

Joe Christopher: OK. I guess the question that I am posing here is about the passing of the PDD which happens on this board. Right? Am I right Ms. Murphy?

Attorney Murphy: The PDD was passed here, but that wasn't the last meeting where that matter was

Joe Christopher: Right, but I was here at the last meeting. I wasn't here when it was passed on this board. This board passes the PDD's, right?

Attorney Murphy: Right.

Joe Christopher: So, I was just wondering if you felt that this was a positive contribution into the development of Halfmoon and Plant Road. Just generally, if anybody would like to speak to that.

Attorney Murphy: Apparently they do not have a comment. Obviously the legislation was passed by the board

Joe Christopher: OK, how about those public benefits? Does anyone know what the public benefits were concerning that PDD

Attorney Murphy: That is all available public information on the website. You can access it at any day and time

Joe Christopher: I did access it, I didn't find a specific heading that said public benefit, but the only thing that I could find was an extension of the water line which seems to serve ten more customers, but it would also preserve, I think the ultimate goal of it was to preserve the water pressure in the area. Then there was the, I guess the traffic mitigation at the end by the Stewart's there on the north end of Plant Road, which I think a lot of people felt wouldn't improve the traffic at that end of the road at all. Those were the only two things that I could see as far as public benefit. Were there other things?

Deputy Supervisor Polak: There were actually improvements to both north and south ends of Plant Road.

Joe Christopher: That's right. You're right. There was a lane at the other end. To me, it seemed like this mitigation would just serve to perpetuate the project. I mean, I guess, that is what it seemed like to me, and I do not think, but given that, do you think that hose benefits offset the costs to the residents in terms of over burdening infrastructure and traffic etc.? I mean

Attorney Murphy: I am just going to reiterate to you that the board voted on it and passed it unanimously

Joe Christopher: Mr. Farone stated that he spent a million dollars on public benefits and the residents don't even care, and that was in a recent Community News article. Do you think that that comment is accurate? I mean, do you think that residents, that is why I was asking about the community benefit, because I thought that maybe, you know, that the public is missing something. Maybe there was some benefit that they were overlooking. No? Alright, I guess that is all that I have, thank you.

Deputy Supervisor Polak: Thank you

Deanna Stephenson, 7 Cindy Lane: I am all over tonight, so just a few questions for you. I am looking for some clarification, my own edification. When we develop land here and you are passing PDD's through the Board and it goes on to the Planning Board, back and forth. In any of that process, do you do any, do you look at the developer for themselves as a business developer. Do you check ratings like a DBA rating or anything like that does that happen at all? I don't know. I am just wondering. Is that a weird question? I am asking and I will tell you why. I did some research on that Plant Road once it went through, did some Google research. That developer had a DBA rating of F, which is kind of concerning to me.

Attorney Murphy: I guess the best way to answer your question. The Board is not allowed to consider who is presenting an application that would be discriminatory in nature. They can't consider that, they can only consider the facts, the legislation, the zoning, all of the other things that are contained in the PDD. They are not allowed to look at you and judge you as an individual and say "You know, we don't really like her, so we are not going to do this." I hope that helps.

Deanna Stephenson: Alright, so that would not be part of the process, OK. Another question; how often and Lyn, this night actually go for you because you might know it off the top of your head, how often are by-laws looked at within set committees of Halfmoon? Say the Planning Board or any other committee that have set by-laws. Do they review them annually, do you

Attorney Murphy: I guess my hesitation to answer your question, like the Planning Board is governed by the laws of the State of New York, so we do not have the authority to overlook the laws of the State of New York

Deanna Stephenson: OK, that is going to lead me onto the next one. So when the Planning Board, is it in their by-laws to when they wanted to elect their Chairman, is that at the pleasure of

Attorney Murphy: It's statutory

Deanna Stephenson: That's statutory, OK, alright, thank you. And then my last question is for selection committees within the town, are they set because two instances where I met with a selection committee, they had the same committee people on them. I don't happen to see John or I don't see Paul, are the set selection committees or is that at the pleasure of the Supervisor?

Attorney Murphy: It is usually determined by who liaisons t what is being looked at.

Deanna Stephenson: OK, were you the liaison to the Ethics and Planning?

Deputy Supervisor Polak: I was the liaison to

Deanna Stephenson: OK, thank you.

Deputy Supervisor Polak: Thank you.

There being no further business to discuss or resolve, on a motion by Councilman Hotaling and seconded by Councilman Wasielewski, the meeting was adjourned at 7:20 pm.
