

#### Goodbye Dog Days of Summer, Hello Fall & Winter

Fall and winter will soon be upon us, so while we make preparations for the cooler weather, we should be sure to figure our four-legged friends into the mix. Here are some tips to keep your fur buddies happy and healthy with the coming change of seasons.


- 1. As colder temperatures arrive, rodents try to seek shelter in our homes and outbuildings. The use of rat and mouse poisons increase as a result. These products are highly toxic to pets and if ingested can be fatal. If you use these products, be very cautious and put them in inaccessible places where your pets cannot go. Also be sure to promptly dispose of rodent carcasses, because secondary ingestion can be just as dangerous.
- 2. Many people prep their car engines at this time of year and change their coolant. Ethylene glycol coolants are highly toxic and their sweet taste is very attractive to pets. Consider switching to propylene glycol coolants while not completely nontoxic, they are much less toxic than traditional coolants.
- 3. Keep school supplies out of the reach of pets glue sticks, markers and pencils can cause stomach upset and blockages if eaten.
- **4.** Stay clear of mushrooms and toadstools. Cooler weather seasons like fall and spring are mushroom months. While most are harmless, approximately 1% are highly toxic and can cause life threatening problems.
- 5. Watch out for ticks! They can gather in piles of dead leaves and grasses and many species can survive the first frost. Check yourself and your pet for any ticks promptly after outdoor activities. Lyme disease is just one of many tick borne illnesses that can affect both you and your pet. Make use of tick collars or preparations to help protect both of you.
- **6.** Fall and winter mean special treats around the holidays. Keep chocolate, grapes and raisins away from pets, as they can be toxic. Rich foods can cause stomach upset, diarrhea and gastroenteritis and in some cases, pancreatitis. Turkey bones can be choking hazards.
- 7. Be careful with decorations. Some pets like to ingest them which can cause dangerous foreign body obstructions in their digestive tracts.
- 8. Don't leave your pets outside for prolonged periods of time. Just because they have fur coats does not mean that they cannot suffer from frost bite and hypothermia. A pet's age, body condition, and breed can all affect how well they tolerate the cold. If it is too cold for you to remain out of doors, it is also too cold for them. Certain medical conditions worsen in cold weather, such as arthritis. Take shorter walks and inspect their feet for ice buildup and rinse off salt preparations when you return inside.

I hope you and your pets have safe, happy and healthy fall and winter seasons!

## So what was it like in Halfmoon 100 years ago?

In the 19th and early 20th centuries, one room schoolhouses were the norm in rural Halfmoon. A single teacher taught students in grades one through eight all together in the same room. The youngest students—called Abecedarians, because they would learn their ABCs—sat in the front, while the oldest sat in the back. The room was heated by a single wood stove.


There was no transportation to get to school. Most schoolhouses were built to serve students living within 4 or 5 miles, which was considered close enough for them to walk. Your great- grandparents really did have to walk five miles in the snow to get to school!

#### Forget Tablets and gel pens.

There were no fancy school supplies in the 19th and early-20th centuries. Students made do with just a slate and some chalk.

#### Very few students advanced beyond grade school.

In 1900, only 11 percent of all children between ages 14 and 17 were enrolled in high school, and even fewer graduated. Those figures had improved only slightly by 1910.

#### School often played second fiddle to work.

Parents often couldn't make ends meet without children working on the family farms, pitching in at family businesses, or getting jobs in mills, mines, or factories outside the home. The children often had to quit school at a young age to go to work.

#### On January 14, 1950 the days of the one room school house came to a close.

The Shenendehowa Central School District was organized by a vote of the residents in the common school districts in Halfmoon, Clifton Park, Malta, Waterford, Ballston & Stillwater. The Shenedehowa Central School District now represents 86 square miles.

Halfmoon School District #4 - McAran's School also know as Cary Road or Anthony School was built in 1832/1833. The school burned in 1950 and was replaced with a Quonset Hut (a military surplus building). Located at the intersection of Cary and Angle Road.



**Halfmoon School District #5**. - West Crescent School. Located on the east side of Dunsbach Road and is currently a private residence.



Halfmoon School #3. - Crescent School or Barney Kane School. Was located at the intersection of Crescent, Vischer Ferry and Beach Road. Mohawk Terrace Apartments now stands on this site.

#### Halfmoon School #7 -

Coons Crossing School from 1875-1929. Located about 15 feet from the railroad tracks near the intersection of Coons Crossing and Staniak Road. (photo not available)



Halfmoon School District #9. - Guideboard School.School was moved across Route 9 to Grooms Road and was the home of the American Legion. It is now home to Sorrentino's Deli.



**Halfmoon District #11**. - Crescent School. Located at the north side of the intersection of Route 9 and Church Hill Road. Eight greder were all in one rom.


### BUSTLING 2019 HALFMOON IS JUST A "DEJA VOUS" OF THE ERIE CANAL DAYS

We talk about all the businesses continually opening up in Halfmoon. Did you know that there was another time that Halfmoon was equally as busy? What we are seeing is a "deja vous" of the Erie Canal days. Crescent (as Halfmoon was called then) had a population in the triple digits and farming was the main industry.

The Erie Canal brought Crescent into a new dimension. The canal could move the farmer's goods from Buffalo to NYC. The local farmers would line their wagons up for a half mile to load and unload goods onto the boats. Stores, Taverns and Hotels opened to service the "Canaler's". Brickyards, Foundry's, Grist and Saw Mills expanded as they had a much larger audience to which they could market their goods.

This newfound growth also caused the need of the opening of the Farmer's Bank of Saratoga County. It was a bustling time in Crescent until replacement of the Erie Canal changed the footprint of Crescent resulting in the closing of many businesses and eventually forced the closing of the Farmer's Bank.


People talk about how much traffic there is on our roads. But in 1823 progress was rapidly changing things in Halfmoon. The stone aqueduct (now the Crescent Bridge), was built to carry the Erie Canal over the Mohawk River. Later, a bridge was built allowing you to walk; take the Stage Coach or your horse & wagon to cross the river. Imagine how excited residents were with this modern convenience! At the north end of the bridge, a



VIvian "Uber" Bornt was 16 years old and working in her father's store. They also had a hotel and gas station located where Lussiers is now.

road was created through a tree laden path now called Route 9. I am sure the local residents were talking about the traffic just as we are today!

Halfmoon sure has seen many changes in the past 100 plus years and I'm sure there is more changes to come. I can't help but wonder what people will be saying about us in 100 years!



#### **CRESCENT POST OFFICE STARTED IN 1852**

John O. Mott was the first Postmaster

Post Office was located in Stella Van Woert's Store.

Stella served as a Postmaster for nearly 20 years from 1909-1929 when it was discontinued.

#### Parks Department

#### Repair & Prepare

Preparing your lawn for winter in the late fall months helps you to ensure that your grass will thrive once spring arrives with strong root development and rich colorful growth. This is especially important if you've recently had sod installed since the sod's first winter can have a major effect on how well it establishes itself.



Gently rake the sod to remove any leaves that may have fallen. Having too many leaves on your lawn blocks light and reduces air flow that is essential to the proper growth of new sod.

Mow your sod during the fall, lowering the blade on your mower slightly each time until the grass is between 1.5 and 2 inches. Apply a winterizing fertilizer or other slow-release nitrogen-rich fertilizer to the sod in November, provided that the sod has been in place for at least six weeks. Water the sod after applying the fertilizer to begin the fertilizer release process and ensure that all fertilizer has

#### Fall Hikes & Foliage

Make sure to capture views of blue skies, evergreens, and colorful foliage while walking or hiking town trails along the Mohawk or Hudson rivers. Overcast skies showcase autumn hues the best. Keep a lookout for migrating birds as well. Be sure to check weather and trail conditions even if you're

settled down to the soil level.



just going on a day hike, and bring essential items such as a compass, tarp, extra food and clothing, waterproof matches, flashlight, and whistle. It's also important to know when hunting season begins and to wear bright clothing such as orange, red, or bright green.



#### On Thin Ice

The winter months offer many unique opportunities to explore by walking, hiking, cross country skiing, and snowshoeing. Follow these ice safety tips when near bodies of water during your adventures around town:

- Obey all posted signs at recreation and watershed areas
- ♦ There should be at least 6 inches of hard ice before walking on it. You can't just look at it to see how thick it is, you actually have to punch a hole in it to figure out how thick it is.
- Beware of ice covered with snow. Snow can insulate ice and keep it from freezing. It can also mask unsafe conditions like hidden cracks and other weak spots.
- Parents should always closely watch and supervise their children, and explain the dangers of playing on frozen reservoirs, lakes, and rivers.

Dear Halfmoon Residents.


Your Highway Department would like to thank you for your cooperation during another productive summer.

We will be heading into the winter season and would like to pass on some reminders and helpful tips.

Please remove all objects from the Town right of way, including basketball hoops. The Town right of way, depending on your road, is between 25' and 30' from the centerline.

When traveling please keep a safe distance from snowplows, and use extreme caution when you see one backing up, remember, the driver is alone.

Avoid pushing snow into or across a road, it is illegal and you can be ticketed.



Garbage and recycling containers should be kept at the edge of the driveway and not in the road. (see Illustration above)

To protect our children, please remind them how dangerous it can be to play or build snow forts near the road, drivers may not see them.

Although we take great care at minimizing mailbox and lawn damage during the winter season, unfortunately sometimes it can not be avoided. To allow us to prepare for future storms, it becomes necessary for the plows to push the snow beyond the edge of the road. If you must install snow markers in the Town right of way, please keep them at least two feet from the edge of the road. This will help prevent them from being knocked down from the weight of the snow as the plow comes through.

Together we all can continue to keep Halfmoon a safe and healthy place to work, live and play. As always, please call 518-664-3127 for questions or comments.

Town Code 120-5:

No person shall park or leave unattended by a licensed driver any vehicle on the pavement or shoulder of any Town highway, road, or street during a period of snowfall, freezing rain or other winter-type weather and for a forty-eight hour period after the precipitation ceases.



#### **Transfer Station**

The Town of Halfmoon operates a Transfer Station and Recycling Center for the convenience of its residents located at 322 Route 146 at the Highway Department facility.

A permit is required to utilize the Transfer Station, permits are available at the Town Clerk's Office.

The Town strives to continue to offer a facility that operates 3 days a week. The revenue collected from user fees help offset the expenses to operate this facility.

#### Receiver of Taxes

Here we are in the fall of 2019, kids back in school, fall colors hopefully on full display and you can enjoy the beauty of autumn.

#### **Water Bills**

In the Receiver of Taxes office our thoughts are to Town of Halfmoon Water Bills and 2020 Saratoga County Property Tax bills. My task at this time is to remind everyone that if your Town of Halfmoon water bill is not paid by 4pm on November 1, 2019 the late fee amount will be on your 2020 Saratoga County Property Tax Bill, there are no exceptions. The account is closed at the end of business that day in order to prepare for the upcoming tax season.

On the Town of Halfmoon website you will also find ACH forms for direct payment of water bills out of your checking account the 4 times a year it is due. It will be deducted on the 20th of the month it is due. There is no extra fee for this service. If you call by phone and want to pay with a credit card there is a processing fee of 3.0927 percent and to pay with a credit card, on the website there is a flat \$5.00 fee per \$400.00. This is not a fee that goes to the Town of Halfmoon but the provider of the service. For those who decide to use a credit card on the website, you can also set up a permanent account for your convenience.

#### **Property Tax**

If you have paid off your mortgage please let Receiver of Taxes office know so your tax bill is sent directly to you. You can find both the change of address form and the 953 form for end of mortgage payments on the Town of Halfmoon website (www. townofhalfmoon-ny.gov) please fill them out and drop them off at the office or mail them to Receiver of Taxes, Town of Halfmoon, 2 Halfmoon Town Plaza, Halfmoon NY 12065 at your earliest convenience.

When you receive your property tax bill, please look it over and if you have any questions please contact my office as soon as possible so if there is an issue we can address it promptly. Please do not wait until the end of the month, this will not give us time to address the issue before the bill will go into penalty.

I also urge anyone who did not receive their school tax bill due to an incorrect address to please make sure this has been corrected with the Town of Halfmoon Assessor's office before the end of October or contact my office to fix this issue.

#### Town Enacts New Zoning & Building Laws to Help Balance Growth & Protect Quality of Life

Earlier this year, the Halfmoon Town Board adopted a series of zoning amendments and changes to the building process to help meet

the needs of our growing town. Halfmoon has become a popular location for young families, retirees and those seeking to take advantage of everything our town and region has to offer. These changes are de-



signed to accommodate growth while helping to preserve our quality of life.


These changes were the culmination of over six years of study by two committees of Town residents, local businesses, and Town staff. After several public workshops and a public hearing, the Town Board adopted many of the recommendations. Highlights of the changes are listed below. For a full summary, please visit the Town website at https://www.townofhalfmoon-ny.gov.

- Enactment of a "cluster subdivision" law to encourage unique subdivision design;
- Newly created zoning districts along Hudson River Rd (Rts 4/32) to promote "clean" manufacturing and waterfront re-development;
- Zoning changes and overlay districts along portions of Crescent Vischer Ferry Rd, Grooms Rd, Sitterly Rd and NYS Rt 146 to encourage small business re-development;
- Changes to building setbacks & wetlands buffers in residential zoning districts;
- New building permit requirements to ensure proper location of structures and minimize stormwater impacts;
- · Expiration of all pool permits after 6 months;
- LED lighting messages may change once every 20 seconds.
