# TOWN OF HALFMOON 2023 BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

## **TOWN BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS**

Historically, the Town of Halfmoon relies on three major sources of revenue for the Town budget, (1) mortgage tax, (2) sales tax and (3) a Highway tax.

This year's Town Budget figures are the result of a number of different statistical data and analysis. The Town Supervisor and Town Budget Officer review actual statistical data of the Town budgets over the past five-year period and then compare it with recent trends to formulate the budget.

The Town Budget is based on very conservative fiscal expenditures and revenues for the 2023 budget year.

## NO GENERAL FUND TOWN PROPERTY TAX

This budget marks the 44th consecutive year there is no general fund Town tax to be levied with the residents of the Town of Halfmoon.

#### **GENERAL, HIGHWAY and WATER FUND**

There is a \$2,500 or \$1.20/hr. raise budgeted for all year-round Town employees. This raise is higher than the raise slated for the final year in the five-year plan to compensate employees for their service, hard work, dedication and to help with the current state of the economy. It also accounts for the continued increase in minimum wage which has affected the Town in hiring for entry level positions.

The 2023 budget reflects a substantial increase in the General Fund revenue of \$430,000 over the 2022 budgeted amount, the majority is from increased sales tax revenue and interest earnings. The sales tax estimate is based on years past and the Saratoga County Treasurer Sales Tax distribution analysis for anticipated receipts in 2023.

The Highway Fund 2023 revenue increased by \$150,000 over the amended budget for 2022; of which \$100,000 is from the highway tax and \$35,000 from interest earned.

The Water Fund revenue will stay basically static for 2023. The Town will use \$88,841 from the Water Fund Debt Reserve. The Water Fund Debt Reserve amount is a portion of the 2020 bond premium for the water main extension that is required to be utilized over the ten-year life of the bond.

The general fund appropriation portion of the budget increased \$484,526 or 6.6 percent from the 2022 adopted budget. The 2022 budget was very lean at the time of completion last year as the Town was facing continued uncertain financial times due to the pandemic. As the Town has seen sales tax and mortgage tax recover with substantial increases in 2022, the Town is in a good financial position to increase the budget for critical and necessary operations in 2023.

The Highway fund appropriations increased \$150,000 or 3.56 percent from the 2022 amended budget. The Highway Tax rate will increase to \$1.315 per \$1,000 of assessed value up from \$1.26, but will stay under the property tax cap. The Town will have a total highway tax levy of \$2,083,990 in 2023. Extensive investment in infrastructure will continue in 2023 to help ensure the Town roads and equipment continue in accordance with the Town's 20-year capital plan. The Highway Budget will be supplemented with revenue that will be generated by sales tax, interest and State monies received from DOT programs.

The Water fund portion of the budget will remain relatively static. There will be no increase to the residents for debt retirement which will continue at \$156 per equivalent domestic unit (EDU). The net result will be an estimated \$434,766 that will be transferred to Capital Reserve to help replenish the drawdown for infrastructure improvements in 2021 for the McBride Water Main Extension. The Town utilizes water fund reserves for infrastructure projects to enhance the Town's water system.

Overall, the Town budget for 2023 increased \$765,507 over the adopted 2022 budget, which is approximately 4.12 percent.

#### PROVIDING NEEDED SERVICES

Our residents continue to use needed services provided by the Town. For example, over 750 seniors actively participate in the Senior Center's educational and recreational programs, along with other services. Nutrition program, Day to Day activities, planned trips and senior van use are important and vital services provided to the seniors.

For our youth, the Summer Recreation Program enrolled 370 children this past summer. The Character Counts program is integrated into the programming for all summer recreation participants who range from first to eighth grade.

The Town partners, with several non-profit organizations, to provide support to Halfmoon children, seniors and families in need. These partnerships include: CAPTAIN, YMA, Center for the Family and Care-Links. The programs offered by these organizations are essential components of our Town as they provide educational, financial, emotional, psychological and other support to those in need.

#### ECONOMIC UNCERTAINTY CONTINUES TO AFFECT HALFMOON

The national economy continues to present realistic challenges to the Town. Although sales tax figures for the calendar year 2022 to date have been higher than budgeted, the Town has continued with its conservative budgeting and spending. The Town will continue to use conservative budget numbers as the national economy continues to be uncertain during this time.

#### **GRANT FUNDING**

The Town continues to aggressively pursue federal, state and other grants. These grant awards have been and will continue to be used for road, sewer, water, energy efficiency improvements, sidewalk, park, trail, recreational, and court projects. These are projects that would have otherwise been funded exclusively by the Town or would have been deferred due to the lack of funds.

## AUDITOR AND BOND RATING AGENCY EVALUATIONS OF TOWN FINANCES

Annually, the Town's finances are examined by an independent auditing firm. For the most recently completed fiscal year 2021, the CPA Firm, BST & Co. issued the following unmodified opinion regarding the Town's financial statements:

"In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town as of December 31, 2021, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America."

The Town of Halfmoon continues to have a very strong credit rating as reflected by S&P Global Rating Action:

"S&P Global Ratings assigned its 'AA" rating to Halfmoon, N.Y.'s \$6.208 million series 2022 general obligation (GO) public improvement bonds. At the same time, we affirmed its 'AA' rating on the town's GO debt. The outlook is stable."

"The rating reflects our view of Halfmoon's:

- Very strong economy, with access to a broad, diverse Albany metropolitan statistical area (MSA);
- Focus on monitoring budgetary performance with standard financial-management policies and practices under our Financial Management Assessment (FMA) methodology and strong Institutional Framework;
- Strong budgetary performance, anchored by sales tax collections and sizeable reserves and liquidity; and
- Manageable debt albeit with sizable other postemployment benefits (OPEB).

We do not allow signs at intersections and things of that nature. There have been sign sweeps and that will continue in accordance with our Town Code. I think that it was important to bring it up at the Town Board meeting that there are specific rules for political signs and they need to be followed and our Code Enforcement will follow those rules and make sure that they are enforced.

**Gary Heller:** I spoke with an engineer that was looking at the intersection and mentioned 3 things about how people will stop at a stop sign

- Traffic light, which is impractical
- Police car sitting there, which is impractical
- Stop sign, which is extremely practical

I wonder if the Board is going to do any such thing or something else to get cars to stop the rate of speed coming down Sommerset Drive before a terrible accident occurs. I have addressed the Board about a year now about this and had the engineers come out twice, traffic law is not an exact science. If someone could answer my question if there is a possibility of lowering the speed limit or placing a stop sign, I certainly would appreciate it.

**Councilman Wasielewski:** Mr. Heller, the last time you spoke we talked about the possibility of switching the stop signs to the opposite corners from Sommerset from where they presently are, we thought that might be more effective. Mr. Bryans, is that something that we have looked into?

**Highway Superintendent Bryans:** (spoke from the audience and could barely be heard) We reached out to MJ Engineering and he just got back to me. He did the study approximately a year ago, he looked at it again and nothing has changed and it's not warranted. As far as the speed limit goes the lowest speed limit in town is 30mph.

**Gary Heller:** When you said that the traffic pattern did not warrant it, did they spend time out there observing the moving traffic?

**Highway Superintendent Bryans:** I cannot tell you exactly how long they were out there

Gary Heller: I could

**Highway Superintendent Bryans:** You can come to my office and I can show you the email or I can get your email and I can forward you the report.

**Gary Heller:** He was approximately 500' from my property and I can tell you he was not out there for more than 20 minutes and there is no way you can get a true traffic pattern in 20 minutes.

**Highway Superintendent Bryans:** I have the speed reports from your area and I can show you the speed reports. Yes, there are some people going over the 30 mph. but the percentage of that

**Gary Heller:** It just takes one and I don't want to be the one standing there if there's going to be one.

**Highway Superintendent Bryans:** What I would suggest to people who call my office about speed reductions and speed study to go to their HOA meeting and tell the people you need to slow down or somebody is going to get hurt

Gary Heller: and they will not listen.

**Supervisor Tollisen:** Alright, let me just ask this one question. So, Mr. Bryans, will you provide the speed study from MJ with them? Let's get one final answer on this because, again per what the Town Attorney says, we cannot just put up stop signs when they are not warranted because it causes a liability to the town. But if they do not have all of that data as far as the speed goes, let's do it and make sure they have all that and we can revisit it one last time to see if there is anything that can be done to address Mr. Heller's concerns. Ok?

Gary Heller: Thank you, sir, thank you.

Chad Smith, 245 So. Main Street: I have concerns about a Halfmoon project that has impacted myself, my family and business interests. It is the culvert project on South Main Street just before the City of Mechanicville. I am looking for some information and to express a complaint. I apologize, I sent an e-mail late Monday night to Connors and Supervisor Tollisen, when it seems it should have gone to Councilman Hotaling. Did either of you get an e-mail?

Supervisor Tollisen: Yes, Mr. Smith and I forwarded your e-mail to Mr. Bryans since he would be in charge of any highway projects and I believe Mr. Bryans has responded to you Monday and I believe that I have a copy of it. You should have gotten a copy stating that it is a Department of Transportation project and while it is located in the Town of Halfmoon, the Town of Halfmoon is not spearheading that project. Mr. Bryans attended a meeting some time ago opposing the closure of that road, that was not something that DOT allowed, but we did object to the closure of the road and that it would create an issue for our town residents. It is a NYS DOT project, Mr. Bryans did respond to you on that, but we are happy to provide with any additional information that we can. I would suggest that you speak with Mr. Bryans and perhaps we can address whatever concerns there are, but I believe that he did respond to you in the e-mail pretty thoroughly.

**Chad Smith:** I have yet to receive it, but I was expecting it from one of you gentlemen, so there is a possibility that it could have gone to my spam and I will check that. I will reach out to your office if I have not received that e-mail.

**Supervisor Tollisen:** Please do, and if you don't mind, give my secretary your phone number and I would be happy to reach out to you tomorrow and talk to you about it as well.

**Chad Smith:** Sounds good. The secondary item is and I understand that work needs to be done roads need to be closed, the secondary portion and the reason why I am standing in front of you, sometimes communication breaks down. It appears that the signage and so forth that is part of your complaint with the DOT and with the State, but also when we contacted the Town of Halfmoon Office, we were redirected to the City of Mechanicville, that they were the ones responsible for the project. Of course, the City of Mechanicville said it wasn't them, which is correct

Supervisor Tollisen: Who did you speak with at the Town?

**Chad Smith:** I don't have a name but I believe it was somebody from the Highway Department.

**Supervisor Tollisen:** Ok, that is something that you should speak to Mr. Bryans about because I believe that the City of Mechanicville is in the same boat as the Town of Halfmoon and that we have both objected to the closure of the road. In our opinion the work that they need to do on the road can be done without closing the road. I understand that the signage has been less than impressive. I do believe also that we have provided our town residents with as much information as we have by letter. We are happy to again address it with you, but communication should be addressed with Mr. Bryans because I don't know who would have spoken with you at the Highway Department and say that.

**Chad Smith:** That is the extent of my concerns. I will follow up and thank you very much for the information.

Supervisor Tollisen: You're welcome.

**Darlene McGraw, 4 North Point:** I am speaking for myself and others who would like to see a noise ordinance in the Town of Halfmoon. Also the sign on Tower Way & Crossing Blvd. saying don't block side road is down and I called the Highway Department

Supervisor Tollisen: Mr. Bryans

**Highway Superintendent Bryans:** We don't normally stock those signs. When the Sitterly Road Bridge was done, Donnelly Construction when they took the detour signs, took Town of Halfmoon signs too. I reached out to Donnelly Construction and they can't find it and I have another sign ordered.

**Darlene McGraw:** I know right where the sign is, I seen it. I will show you right where the sign is.

Highway Superintendent Bryans: You said that the sign was missing

**Darlene McGraw:** I said that it was laying down on the ground, I didn't say it was missing.

**Highway Superintendent Bryans:** It should be done by the end of this week and if not Monday and the sign will be back up.

Darlene McGraw: Ok.

**Supervisor Tollisen:** Alright, anyone else?

There being no further business to discuss or resolve, on a motion by Councilman Connors and seconded by Councilman Wasielewski, the meeting was adjourned at 7:35 pm.
