
WHEREAS, we routinely witness the heroic efforts of fire fighters who put themselves in harm's way to protect our lives and our property; and

“John (D’Alessandro), this is Rosa LaBoy and she has a special gift for your department that she wanted to present to you on behalf of the residents of Bishop Hubbard for everything that your department did.”

Supervisor Wormuth read the 2013 Tentative Budget Summary

TOWN OF HALFMOON
2013 TENTATIVE BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

NO TOWN PROPERTY TAX AND NO TOWN HIGHWAY TAX: This budget marks the 34th consecutive year there has been no Town tax. This is also the 28th consecutive year with no Highway tax. I am pleased to continue this tradition by presenting my sixth, consecutive budget to the Town Board that does not require a Town Property Tax, nor a Town Highway Tax.

This is an outstanding achievement that needs to be put in perspective. In 2011, the most recent year that information is available, the NYS Comptroller's Office determined that only 36 towns in New York State did not collect a town property tax! Halfmoon is one of only 36 towns out of 932 townships that did not collect a town property tax in 2011!

PROVIDING NEEDED SERVICES IN THE FACE OF A NATIONAL RECESSION: Our residents continue to use needed services provided by the Town. For example, over 750 seniors actively participate in the Senior Center educational, recreational and other programs and services. Meals-on-Wheels is a well known program and a vital service provided by the Senior Center to the most in need seniors in our Town.

On the other end of the age spectrum, the Town's Summer Recreation Program enrolled over 700 children this past summer. The Character Counts program is integrated into the programming for all summer recreation participants whose ages range from pre-school to 15 years old.

The Town partners with other non-profit organizations to provide support to Halfmoon youth and families in need. These partnerships include: CAPTAIN, Center for the Family, Care-Links, and the YMCA Reach Out for Youth program. The Town Board and my commitment to provide these and other services in a cost effective manner is demonstrated by this budget which does not include a Town property tax.

NATIONAL ECONOMIC RECESSION EFFECTS LOCAL MUNICIPALITIES: The current poor national economic condition presents challenges to the Town, the same as faced by members of our community. As nearly everyone is aware, the national economic downturn has reduced consumer spending and slowed economic activity in the housing industry. This in turn impacts the revenues collected by virtually every town, including Halfmoon. Sales and mortgage taxes have only begun to generate the same amount of revenue prior to the recession. These revenues for the Town in 2011 (the most recently completed fiscal year) reached the \$5M level for the first time since 2007.

In the face of these reduced revenues, certain mandated expenses for the Town continue to increase. For example retirement, health insurance, and other benefits have increased by more than \$84,000 from 2012 in the general fund. I offer the following budget strategies to deal with the challenges presented by the continuing poor economic climate and escalating, mandated costs.

The 2013 general fund budget is reduced by more than \$1M which is slightly more than a 14% reduction. This was accomplished by moving the Clifton Park Halfmoon Emergency Corp out of the general fund budget. The Town has started the process to create an ambulance district for the Emergency Corp. An ambulance district already exists for the Emergency Corp in the Town of Clifton Park and this action will align Halfmoon with that organizational structure. The ambulance district is also similar to fire districts, where residents pay for the services provided by the department.

The 2013 budget contains no salary increases for the Town workforce. The continuing poor economic climate contributes greatly to this tough decision to keep salaries at the same level as 2012.

The 2013 highway budget is reduced from its 2012 level by approximately \$67,000. This reduction is due to decreasing the amount of funds devoted to equipment replacement. These actions illustrate some of the ways this budget exerts strong controls on appropriations. These creative measures to reduce Town costs all help to lessen the impact on our residents while we all feel the fiscal pressures of the continuing poor economic climate.

The water fund budget increases from its 2012 levels for two reasons. The Town continues to purchase water from the City of Troy due to GE's dredging of the Hudson River. The City of Troy has increased its cost to the Town of Halfmoon, and we have no choice but to include this increase in the water rate for 2013. The second reason for the increase is due to legal fees associated with suing GE for the increased costs the Town of Halfmoon is incurring due to the purchasing of water from Troy and for the inactivity of the Town's water treatment plant.

The 2013 budget continues the practice started last year, to use funds from reserve accounts as an income source. These revenues are derived from reserve funds where the projects are now completed. With the completion of these projects, the Town can use these reserve funds to make debt payments. Thus, the prudent use of reserve funds from completed projects to pay down municipal bond debt is another strategy used in the 2013 budget.

These strategies and several other budget decisions at the line item level, result in a 2013 budget that contains no Town property tax and no highway tax.

2012 BUDGET FREEZE: Since the beginning of August I have instituted a budget freeze for 2012 spending. This means only expenditures for the health, safety and welfare of our community can be incurred without my express, prior approval. This action limiting current spending, in conjunction with tight appropriations control for 2013, demonstrates our commitment to keeping Halfmoon fiscally sound.

BONDED DEBT: The Town of Halfmoon, along with nearly every other municipality in NYS, carries a debt load. In the case of the Town of Halfmoon, the debt was incurred through the sale of municipal bonds. These bonds were sold for capital projects including the construction of the new Town Hall, the Town Family Park, the Water Treatment Facility, and reconstruction of Brookwood Road. This bonded debt is approximately \$40 million, which is significantly less than the Town's constitutional debt limit of approximately \$330 million.

Typically, municipalities do not pay cash for large capital projects such as these. To have the necessary cash on hand to finance these types of capital projects would mean the Town would have to generate revenues significantly greater than expenses over the course of several years. The Town has wisely decided not to pursue this strategy, which means money remains in the pockets of our residents and not in Town accounts.

A cost-savings strategy employed by this budget relates to bonded debt. The Town Board and I decided to refinance bonds originally sold in 2002. This action takes advantage of the current low interest rates for bonds, saving \$26,110 in the 2013 budget. Over the life of the new bond the total savings is \$309,675.

GRANT FUNDING: Since first being appointed Town Supervisor in 2007, we have aggressively pursued federal, state and other grants. As a result of our efforts, over the last four years the Town has obtained twenty-eight grants totaling over \$6M. These grants have funded road, sewer, water, energy efficiency improvements, sidewalk, park, trail, recreational, and court projects. These are projects that would have otherwise been funded exclusively by the Town or would have been deferred due to the lack of funds.

AUDITOR AND BOND RATING AGENCY EVALUATIONS OF TOWN FINANCES: Annually the Town's finances are examined by an independent auditing firm. For the most recently completed fiscal year 2011, the CPA Firm, Bollam, Sheedy, Torani & Company issued the following opinion regarding the Town's financial statements and internal controls:

"We did not identify any significant of unusual transactions of significant account policies in controversial or emerging areas for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus."

The Town of Halfmoon continues to have a very strong credit rating as reflected by Moody's August 2012 rating of the Town with its "Aa2" designation. Moody's defines its Aa2 rating as,

"Obligations rated Aa are judged to be of high quality and are subject to very low credit risk."

These positive statements and evaluations from independent, outside firms confirm the Town has a stable, sound financial base. This strong financial condition of the Town is the result of the combined efforts of the Town Board, the Town Supervisor and all of our Town staff.

PUBLIC PRIVILEGE (for discussion of non-agenda items)

Paula Davis: I am the manager of Halfmoon Heritage Apartments and the Falcon Trace Luxury Apartments as well as a resident of Halfmoon Heritage Apartments. I have been a resident in Clifton Park – Halfmoon area for 25 years.

I have read several of the comments that have been made regarding the moratorium of the multi-family housing projects. The one in particular that I found most offensive as the manager of the properties as well as a resident, are the comments made by Bruce Rischert in his “Gold Rush” letter.

Reading the reviews that Mr. Rischert quoted in his letter is not an accurate picture of my properties. There is no business or service that can completely satisfy every customer. There are businesses in Halfmoon that I will not patronize because of bad experiences; however I choose not to announce them online. Regardless of the

negative reviews that Mr. Rischert pointed out, we readily maintain 99 to 100% occupancy. I believe our occupancy rate is a much better definition of Halfmoon Heritage. I also found it interesting that Mr. Rischert did not put forward any apartment reviews on other Halfmoon apartment complexes to make his point, only Bruce Tanski properties.

Mr. Tanski is a lifelong resident in the area. He creates and provides many jobs in this town. He is one of the highest taxpayers in Halfmoon. Mr. Tanski donates to many organizations in Halfmoon and supports many youth programs. He is a very hard working man. I'm very proud to work with him and be affiliated with his organization. I would suggest Mr. Reichert, that rather than personally attack Mr. Tanski, he sticks to the relevant arguments of a moratorium.

Providing multi-family housing has many positive effects on our community. As our community grows, families moving from other states and other regions of New York, often rent apartments in order to learn more of the area, schools, and other things in our town. Our town benefits from these tenants as they shop in our stores, and patronize our businesses, increasing the sales tax revenue. They participate in our local elections and participate in our town activities. Here's a few facts about our tenants: The average salary of my tenants is approximately \$74,000 per year. In 2010 and 2011, 36 tenants have purchased homes in Saratoga County. There's more this year as well. We have a tenant base of retirees and empty nesters that no longer want the burden of maintaining a home, lawn maintenance or snow removal. They are hardly transient undesirables. Living in single family homes or neighborhoods, does not make you a better resident or a better person for that matter. Our tenants work hard, take pride in where they live and contribute to our community in many positive ways.

Lastly, I hardly think that Halfmoon Heritage is an atrocity or a "cancerous tumor". Our buildings are tastefully built, beautifully landscaped and maintained. I invite you to drive through Halfmoon Heritage or Falcon Trace and see for yourself. Thank you.

Supervisor Wormuth: Thank you

Lisa Rosamino: Manager of the Bishop Hubbard Senior Apartments spoke from the audience and the recording was not very clear.

I want to thank the Fire Departments and also a heartfelt thank you to the community for all they did for us. This fire took place on July 20th and I had the good fortune to be at the beaches in Jersey. When I came back, we had no electricity for close to 7 weeks. I honor Mr. Tanski as well and we will hold this community in our hearts for all that you have done for us. This is the most generous community.

We went through a very difficult time and this fire was a severe hardship. Many of the residents were homeless and had to stay in hotels and didn't have the money to buy food, there is no extra. The Meals on Wheels came all the way to the Latham hotels for them.

The Fire Departments were 5 Star, every single Fire Department! I know who was woken up at 4:00 in the morning for that fire and I know who responded to it. The dedication, hard work, support and John Cooper, Dave, and the Halfmoon Express, Meals on Wheels, Harvest Church brought bags of groceries every single day for our residents, etc. the stuff that you do for us every single day. The Town of Halfmoon rocks!

I just wanted to say that is why we are here today. We haven't begun to write thank you notes. We are just catching up. You deserve to be thanked properly and you will always be in our hearts for everything that you did. I know you, Mindy spearheaded most of this. The residents don't know all of what went on. We were

out of the building for 7 weeks, but the blessings are that not a person was hurt, not an apartment was lost. The fact is that it was mostly the common areas. If it was any worse, it would have been devastating. We are all back in our rooms.

Supervisor Wormuth: I want to say as I make my way up to the dais, as much as I kind of got woken up at 4:00 am, it was more like 4:30 by the time our Highway Superintendent got ahold of me because my phone was on vibrate and vibrated right off the nightstand that it was on and fell onto the carpet. When he called me, he was already there. So we thank our Highway Superintendent and all of his staff, as well as all of the firefighters. John also runs the Senior Express Meals on Wheels. He really was and always is an intracal part of everything that goes on. I wouldn't be as successful as I am without these Board members. Every one of these Board members showed up to the emergency shelter that we set up at the Senior Center. My staff was there early, my staff stayed late. Everybody was there to make sure that until every one of our seniors had a place to go and a place to put their head and rest that night, we weren't going to stop. I couldn't do it without everyone who is here. Part of my staff all sitting up here as well as those who are in the audience and at home tonight, so I thank every one of them. I couldn't do what I do without them. We love you guys, we will always be there, we are going to continue to be there and we are so thankful that nobody was hurt. It was amazing walking through that building seeing the fire just existed in that one hallway. I ruined a good pair of shoes but it was well worth it! At the end of the day, one of the firefighters took me out and said come and look, the flames started in a room and went down the stairway and a little bit on either side of the hallway, but where each apartment door started, those flames ended because the firefighters were there to make sure they did. I am just so grateful that there was no loss of life and that the property could be restored and everyone is back. So, that is what I am most thankful for about this tragedy. Thank you.

Bruce Reichert, 18 Willowbrook Terrace; Yeah, I just want to make a statement in regards to Paula Davis's statement earlier. My letter was in regards to the proposal of Anna's Place, which is a 165 unit complex of apartments in a residential area. And it was in support of actually Mr. Bruce Tanski's assertion that he does not build to the standards of the other builders in the area and that this is just a money thing for him. So, yeah, I did point out Mr. Tanski in my letter, of course, and it was a simple search, easy to do, type in his name and rental and you will find all of the information that I just pointed out in my letter. That is all that I have to say as my retort to the previous comment. Thank you.
